From a governance perspective I am grateful to the Heads of School for their engagement and commitment to advance the objects of our Association.

All member schools of the Association can be proud of the inclusive nature of our Association and that not only is participation, fellowship and group achievement promoted, so too standards of excellence that support elite pathways for our individual students. It was wonderful to see the students rewarded for their effort and achievement at the annual SAAS Awards Night earlier this month.

It has been pleasing to see the Association prove to be an effective vehicle for supporting the wellbeing and pastoral initiatives that exist in our member schools.



The Pink and Blue rounds are good examples of how all students can draw their attention to important health promotion initiatives that are embedded in our schools and wider community. The expansion of the Indigenous round across sports has also seen great awareness of Acknowledgement of Country and reconciliation.

The Board has undertaken an executive review of the SAAS office and is looking to adopt the recommendations that aim to underpin the ongoing professional execution of the Association's business and administration. There is no way to proceed with these improvements without an impact to our financial bottom line. Member schools should feel confident that any increase in future fees has been appropriately scrutinised and considered by the Board. Looking to the future, negotiation of the territory that exists between our Association and both community and professional clubs is challenging and not without risk. The Board will devote time to this important matter in the future with a view to both protecting and advancing the objects of our Association.

On behalf of the SAAS Board I thank the staff of our schools who fulfil the work of the Association. Our Heads and Directors of Sport who govern and action the work of the Sports Program Committee and also our key sports staff in leadership positions who undertake the essential work of the Activity Sub- Committees. These bodies have done a great job tidying up the organisation of each sport, drafting and updating policies and providing the SAAS office with good guidance. Further, I thank all officials and volunteers.

Finally, I extend my thanks to the loyal and dedicated service of the SAAS office, chiefly Leo and Nicole for their patience and commitment to continuing to lift the standards of our Association while supporting all members schools. Their countless hours of work and patience is appreciated.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

In 2024, SAAS continued to offer a robust co-curricular sports program, engaging students across a wide range of sports in both Summer and Winter seasons.

The association remains committed to refining and improving its offerings to member schools. This year saw strong growth in team and player numbers, with interest shifting from traditional sports like AFL and Cricket to indoor options such as Basketball, Badminton, and Volleyball, as well as outdoor Soccer.

This surge has increased demand on school gym facilities. Touch Football and Cross Country have also expanded, with Cross Country now drawing over 200 runners per event after rebounding from near decline. Competition quality has been outstanding, especially in Open A Basketball and 1st XI Soccer, where several schools performed at high levels throughout the season.

SAAS has also expanded its social media presence through Facebook, Instagram, and TikTok. This effort aims to boost the profile of the association, particularly in the competitive landscape between school and club sports.

Key Calendar Events

The Pink, Blue, and Reconciliation Rounds were once again highly successful, with alignment across IGSSA, Catholic Girls, and SAAS calendars enabling co-educational schools to participate together and strengthen social awareness initiatives. SAAS also hosted its second Blockbuster Round at Thebarton Oval, a triple-header Football event that drew strong attendance, high live-stream engagement, and positive feedback from all involved.

Over the past five years (2020-2024), SAAS has experienced growth in various sports while others have remained stable or seen a slight decline.

Grand Finals and Showcase Events

The 2024 season showcased the strength of the SAAS sports programs through high-profile finals:

- Football Division 1 Grand Final: Held at Adelaide Oval, made possible through collaboration with SANFL.
- Soccer Division 1 & 2 Grand Finals: Hosted at Soccer State Park
- 1st XI Cricket Grand Final: Played at Karen Rolton Oval
- Basketball Grand Finals: Nazareth College hosted six finals on a single day

Ongoing Improvements

SAAS continues to refine its programs with the introduction of finals and Player of the Year awards. Media coverage has expanded through filmed matches, live-streams, and journalism by Gordan Armstrong for Senior Football, 1st XI Soccer, and Open A Basketball, further elevating the association's profile.

Positives

- Sport growth: Strong participation in Basketball, Volleyball, Badminton, and Cross Country.
- Student engagement: Consistently high weekly involvement highlights sport's importance in SAAS schools.
- Social media: Increased engagement has strengthened community connections and visibility.

Concerns

- · Declining traditional sports: Reduced participation in Football and Cricket.
- Umpire and official shortages: Ongoing recruitment challenges affecting competition quality.
- · Facility pressure: Indoor sport growth straining school gyms.
- Club competition: School vs club sport conflicts impacting participation.
- Rising costs and staffing: Higher expenses and coordinator shortages affecting program delivery.
- · Coordinator turnover: Frequent staff changes reducing continuity.
- Investment gaps: Some schools underinvesting in sustaining quality sport programs.
- System replacement: Need for a new sports management system suited to SAAS operations.

Challenges and Financial Overview

SAAS continues to navigate challenges including competition with club sports, the SANFL U16 program, limited facilities, maintaining balanced competitions, and sourcing qualified officials. Insurance costs also rose by nearly \$5,000 with a new provider.

Despite these pressures, the association remains financially stable, supported by strong school engagement. Operations have been streamlined through direct payment of officials, reducing schools' administrative workload. In the 2024 Winter Season, officials' costs totalled \$72,000 for AFL, \$107,000 for Basketball, and \$27,000 for Soccer.

Future Aims

SAAS is focused on several key priorities, including:

- · Implementing a new Sports Management System tailored to the association's needs.
- · Collaborating with SANFL for umpire appointments in SAAS AFL competitions.
- Rolling out a 2025 Strategic Plan to align fixtures and refine competition structures.
- Strengthening the SAAS brand through greater social media presence and expanded media coverage.
- Securing access to premium facilities to enhance the student and school experience.
- · Exploring the introduction of new sports based on member school interest.
- Establishing SAAS representative teams to further elevate the association's profile.

SAAS remains committed to building on its progress and reinforcing its role as the leading school sports competition in South Australia.


The Open A3 competition was won by Scotch College, while St Peter's College claimed victory in both the Middle A1 and Middle A2 divisions.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER 2024

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared for distribution to the Board of Management in order to satisfy their financial reporting requirements under the Associations' Incorporation Act of South Australia 1985 and the entities constitution. The Board of Management has determined that the Sports Association for Adelaide Schools (the entity) Incorporated is not a reporting entity, and therefore, there is no requirement to apply Australian Accounting Standards in the preparation of these Accounts.

The financial report covers the Sports Association for Adelaide Schools as an individual entity. The Sports Association for Adelaide Schools is an association incorporated in South Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 1985.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs including the going concern assumption and does not take into account changing money values, except where stated. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The Entity has prepared the financial report in accordance with the following applicable Australian Accounting Standards and UIG Interpretations.

AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 110: Events after the Balance Sheet Date

AASB 1031: Materially

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the association in the preparation of the financial report and are in the opinion of the Board of Management, appropriate to meet the needs of the Board. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Income Tax

The association is a Not-for-Profit body for taxation purposes and has been granted an exemption from income tax by the Commissioner of Taxation.

(b) Inventories

Inventories, when applicable, are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned on a specific identification basis and include direct costs and appropriate overheads if applicable. Inventory held is not deemed to be material.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

When applicable, Plant and equipment are measured on the cost or fair value basis. The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the association to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash inflows that will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash inflows have not been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amount.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER 2024

Depreciation

The Entity, when applicable depreciates its assets in accordance with their useful lives.

(d) Leases

Lease payments under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the period in which they are incurred.

(f) Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for the association's liability to employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave (where applicable) which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee entitlements payable later than one year have been measured on the same basis. Contributions are made by the association to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(g) Cash

For the purposes of accounts preparation, cash includes cash on hand and at banks.

(h) Revenue

Operating revenue is recognised by the association in the period to which the association is committed to providing the members and patrons with the services implied by membership and patronage of the entity's facilities. Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Income, Expenses and Assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

(j) Reclassification of Financial Information

Comparative amounts may have been reclassified in order to comply with the presentation format. The reclassification of comparative amounts has not resulted in a change to the equity of the association as reported in the prior year's financial report.
